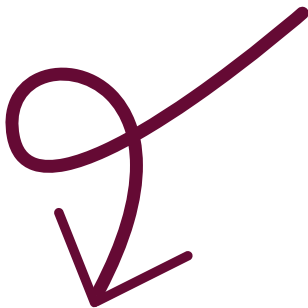

Dutton Farm Founder Michele Smither and daughter, Rebecca Smither

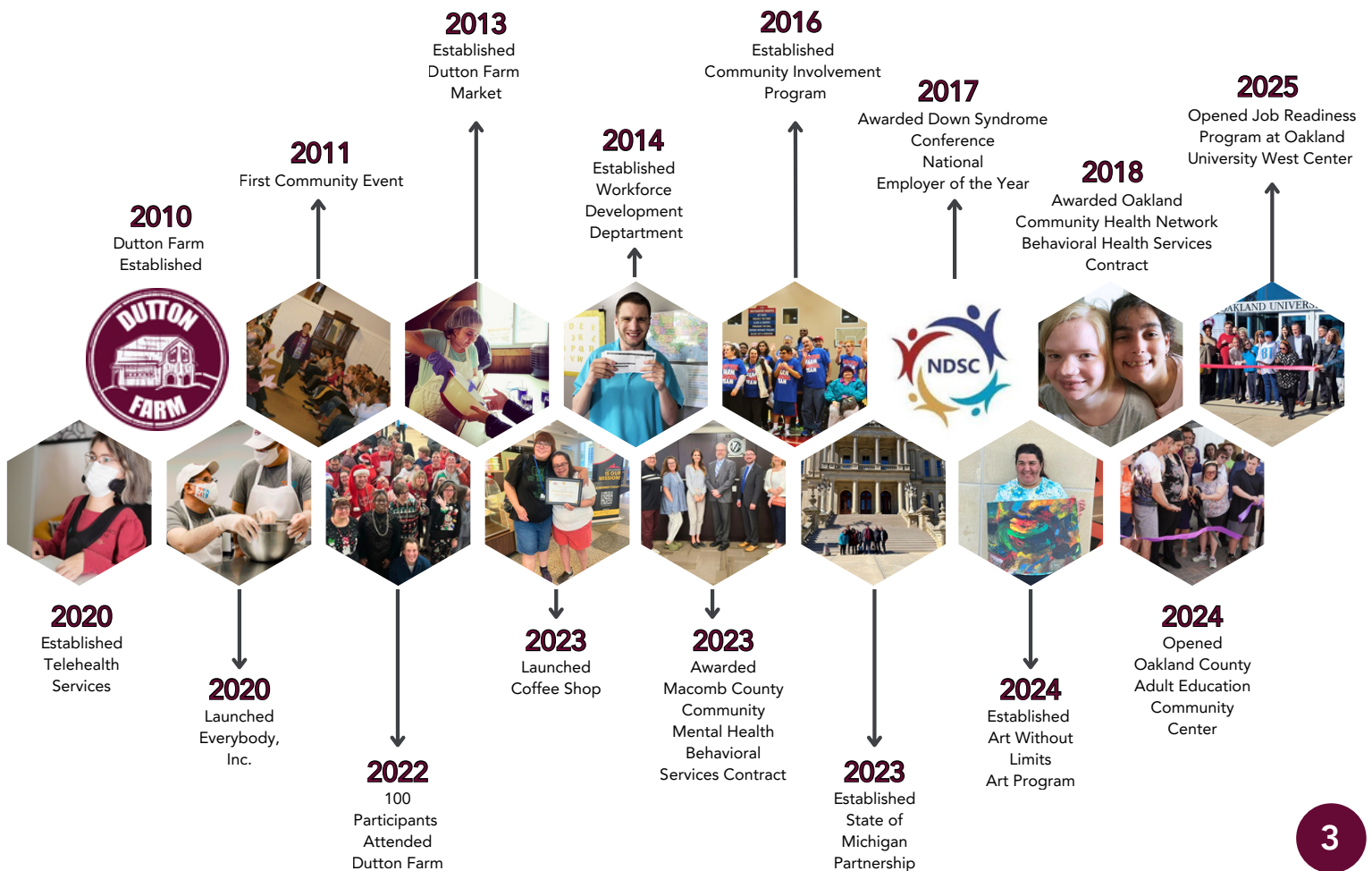
In 2010, Dutton Farm was founded out of deep love and respect for Rebecca "Becca" Smither, the daughter of Michele Smither.

After years of watching Becca struggle to find the right support to nurture her talents and continue growing as an adult, Michele knew it was time for a change.

With a generous donation of property and ongoing support from Becca's father, Jim Smither, Dutton Farm established its home in Rochester, MI.

The farm became a place of friendship, support, and hope, not just for Becca, but for others seeking similar opportunities. Recognizing the program's potential, Michele and her daughter, Jenny Brown, assembled a team to advocate for and carry out their mission: "Empowering and supporting adults with disabilities to live a life of purpose, inclusion, and dignity."

Today, Dutton Farm continues to provide opportunities for adults with disabilities through adult education, community involvement, art, and workforce development, inspiring others to recognize the invaluable contributions that individuals with unique abilities bring to the world.



Letter From the CEO

When my parents founded this organization, they were answering a question that too many families were being left to face alone: What happens to my child when the world stops making room for them?

The answer they built was not a waiting room; it was a launching pad. A place grounded in inclusion, where adults with disabilities have real opportunities to contribute, grow, and be part of their communities in meaningful ways.

I think about a moment that captures this perfectly

His poise and authenticity moved everyone in the room. More importantly, his message created real traction for opportunities we are actively pursuing in 2026, opportunities that will open doors for many more individuals with disabilities seeking employment.

That moment is what Dutton Farm is about.

Employers who hire from Dutton Farm don't just gain dedicated employees; they gain a broader understanding of what ability looks like. Community partners who open their doors find their teams communicating, collaborating, and leading differently. Even volunteers often leave changed themselves.

That's what genuine inclusion does. It doesn't just create space for people who have been left out, it strengthens the space for everyone.

That's why expanding into Macomb County matters so much.

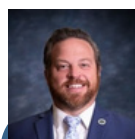

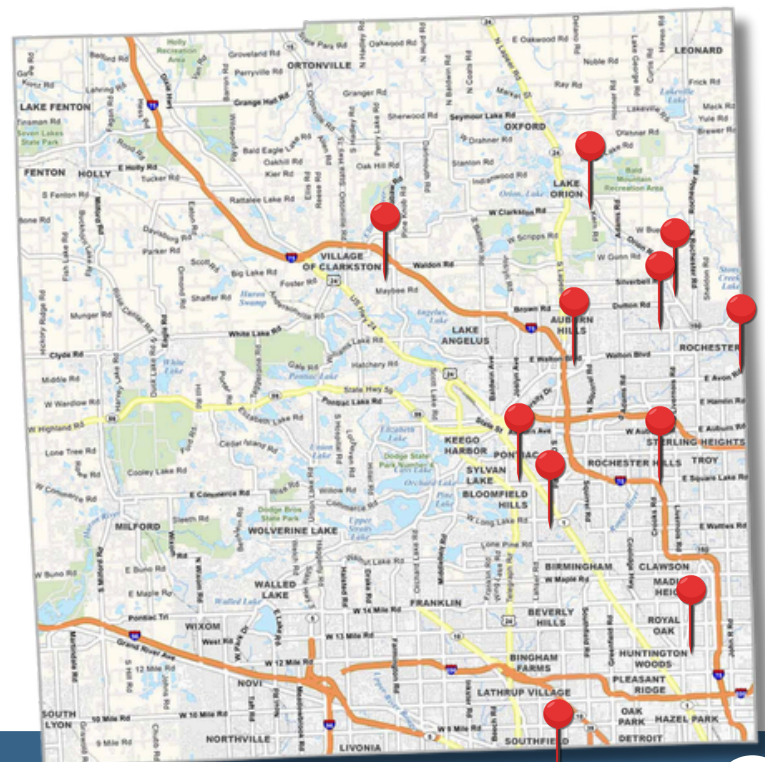
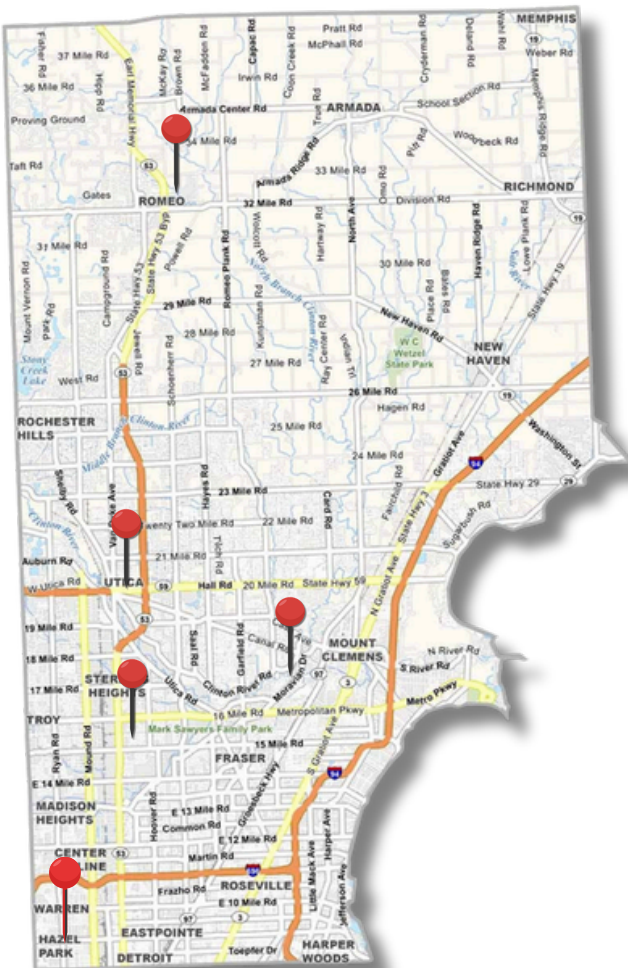

Art Without Limits

At Dutton Farm, art is more than creative expression, it's a way of being seen. Through Art Without Limits, participants explore materials, experiment with techniques, and share their work with the community in meaningful ways.

Gordan Durst is one of many artists who has found both connection and confidence through the program. In the studio, he gravitates toward projects that allow for creativity and focus. He enjoys working with beads and especially loves painting, where he can embrace the freedom of the process. Just as important are the relationships he builds, spending time with Andrew A. and sharing jokes with Brett.

Over time, Gordan has grown more independent in his work. He now initiates and completes projects on his own, relying less on staff support and demonstrating a greater sense of ownership.

That growth has extended beyond the studio.

In 2025, after earning income from his artwork, Gordan opened his first bank account, an important step in turning his creative work into something he can manage and build on. With his earnings, he has paid for his haircuts, ordered meals independently, taken his mom out to dinner, and is planning to purchase a new bicycle.

Gordan's growth is grounded in a program designed to offer both variety and choice in how participants create and express themselves. Participants work across a wide range of mediums, including acrylic and watercolor painting, mosaic tiling, clay, beading, paper making, and seasonal pieces like garden stones and wind chimes. Each piece reflects time in the studio and a personal point of view.

In 2025, that work reached beyond the studio walls. Participants exhibited and sold artwork at events across the region, including the Pontiac Spring and Winter Open Studios, Lake Orion Flower and Art Festival, Berkley Art Bash, Arts, Beats & Eats, and Sterlingfest.

Together, these opportunities generated \$14,745.35 in program sales, with participants averaging \$711.55 in earnings.

The year also marked an expansion of space and visibility with the opening of a newly renovated art studio on the Oakland campus. Additionally, several participants, including Gordan, Amelia, Judy, and Abby, had work selected for the Breaking Barriers Gallery in Lansing, and Judy was featured at a Lansing Lugnuts game as part of Disability Pride Month.

From studio tables to gallery walls to community events, participant work continues to reach new audiences. Through Art Without Limits, our artists' creativity becomes something shared, seen, valued, and carried into the world.

Finding Connection, Building Confidence

When Kyle Smith first came to Dutton Farm, he knew what he liked, video games and anime. While he participated in activities and outings, he often found himself waiting to return to what felt most comfortable.

Over time, something began to change.

Kyle started building friendships. Today, he enjoys being part of the community, laughing with peers, joining conversations, and sharing his interests. His love of anime has become a powerful way to connect, opening the door to friendships and a sense of belonging. At home, his mom, Debera Mckenzie, sees the difference.

"He talks about it all the time," she shared. "He's respected and treated kindly."

Visitors often meet Kyle as one of the first friendly faces on campus, eager to share his latest experience and inquire about their favorite Pokémon card. In these moments, his confidence shines.

Kyle's journey is about more than participation, it's about building confidence, bonds, and finding where you belong.

Growing Community in Macomb County

Kyle's story is one of many.

In 2025, Dutton Farm welcomed 5 new participants into our Macomb County programs, stretching the capacity of our Sterling Heights location and expanding opportunities for connection and growth.

Throughout the year, participants explored local parks, trails, and libraries, building independence and confidence while connecting with the world around them.

With a donation from Genisys Credit Union, participants extended their horticulture work into the Sterling Heights Community Garden, creating inclusive, hands-on experiences in the broader community.

We also welcomed Program Manager Michele Bachler, whose 15 years of experience in workforce development strengthens our ability to support participants choosing competitive, integrated employment as their journey.

The year concluded with a new tradition, our first annual Christmas program, bringing families, participants, and staff together in a celebration filled with music, laughter, and pure joy.

Jacob's Story

Program

Building Relationships, Discovering Purpose

When Jacob first joined Dutton Farm, he was shy, often isolating himself and struggling to ask for help. Transitions were especially difficult, he frequently refused to get out of the car in the morning and would rush out at the end of the day as soon as he saw his dad.

Today, Jacob's story is one of remarkable growth.

As he has become more comfortable, his personality has begun to shine in so many ways. This winter, he became known for tossing snowballs at cars in the drop-off line, a playful habit that brought laughter to everyone around him. He has formed a meaningful friendship with another participant, Robin, and now actively participates in outings and daily activities. At pickup time, he no longer rushes out, but instead patiently waits for his turn to head home.

One especially meaningful moment captured just how far Jacob has come. When he saw another participant struggling to open a lunchbox, he stepped in and said, "Hey Ryan, I'll help you." Though Jacob can sometimes be difficult to understand, his words were clear when his friend needed him most. Moments like these show that Jacob is not only building confidence, he is building empathy, friendships, and a true sense of belonging.

That same spirit of growth can be seen across Dutton Farm. This year, we welcomed Hannah Paul as the new Site Manager at Dutton Farm–Oakland, bringing nearly a decade of experience supporting adults with disabilities and a deep commitment to community inclusion and family partnerships.



The farm itself continues to grow as well. This season, we welcomed two miniature goats, Cardinal and Emu, along with two new bunnies, Clementine and Clover. These additions bring joy while creating new hands-on learning opportunities through our animal care program.

With support from the Michigan Green Industry Association, the farm grounds were also enhanced with a new patio, trees and landscaping, a goat climbing feature, cornhole, and a new flagpole.

Our weekly Farmers Market during the summer remains a highlight, giving participants the opportunity to engage with neighbors and strengthen community connections.

Each of these moments, whether it's Jacob helping a friend, participants welcoming customers at the market, or volunteers investing in the farm, reflects what Dutton Farm is all about: creating opportunities for purpose, dignity, and inclusion.

Quinn's Story

Readiness

Job Readiness

On October 21, 2025, Dutton Farm celebrated the ribbon cutting of its Job Readiness Program at Oakland University's West Center in Auburn Hills, marking an important step forward in expanding access to meaningful employment preparation for adults with disabilities.

At Dutton Farm, a job is about more than a paycheck. It is about belonging, contributing, and knowing your work matters. The Job Readiness Program is the first step on that path, equipping participants with the skills needed to enter the workforce with confidence. Through hands-on learning, individuals build resumes, practice interviews, strengthen communication, and develop workplace skills such as time management and professional etiquette.

Learning takes place in a real college environment, where participants are immersed in spaces that have not always been accessible or inclusive. That experience alone helps shift what feels possible for participants like Quinn Russell.

Referred to Dutton Farm by Michigan Rehabilitation Services in September 2025, Quinn brought more than a decade of experience at Joann Fabrics. Through our person-centered approach, she began exploring her goals through job shadowing, gaining exposure to four employment sites aligned with her interests, including both longstanding and new employer partners.

At Michaels, Store Director Diane and her team created a welcoming, hands-on learning environment. Quinn built on her existing skills while gaining experience in stocking, cutting fabric, inflating balloons, and organizing merchandise. Through that process, she clarified her employment goals and achieved them. Today, Quinn is a valued member of the Michaels team.

Stories like Quinn's are becoming the norm, not the exception, when the right supports are in place. That kind of change is made possible through strong partnerships and bold investment. In 2025, the A.A. Van Elslander Foundation made a transformational \$125,000 investment in this program and the individuals it will serve.

"Dutton Farm's Job Readiness Program meets every person where they are and teaches the "soft skills" needed to pursue real opportunities and meaningful employment. We are proud to stand behind that kind of work and access,"

Looking ahead, Dutton Farm will continue to grow the Job Readiness Program, deepen employer and community partnerships, and create more pathways to competitive, integrated employment across Southeast Michigan.

Supported Cari's Story Employment

Supported Employment

At Dutton Farm, employment is not the end goal, it's the beginning of something bigger. It's where independence grows, relationships form, and individuals find a true sense of belonging in their communities.

Cari Mellesmoen has been part of that journey since March 2022. At Tangico, she has grown from someone who was once quiet and reserved into a valued team member who shares her sense of humor, talks sports with coworkers, and takes pride in her work.

"I like making my own money. I spend it on candy and taking my mom out to dinner. The people at Tangico are nice and always support me. They make sure I have things to do, and we tell lots of jokes, it's fun," said Cari Mellesmoen.

Cari's success is strengthened by the support of her job coach, Al Ferguson, whose approach balances guidance with independence. "The environment at Tangico is very inclusive and supportive," Al shared. "They make an effort to include everyone and treat Cari with respect and dignity." Over time, Cari has taken on new responsibilities and become more integrated into the day-to-day work of the business.

That partnership has not gone unnoticed. As Sue Kinch of Tangico shared, "Cari is fantastic—dependable, dedicated, and consistently produces excellent work. Al's encouragement and professionalism make a meaningful difference, not only for Cari but for our entire team. The partnership between Cari and Al is inspiring."

Stories like Cari's are made possible through intentional support and strong employer partnerships. Today, Dutton Farm supports individuals working across 14 government-recognized industries, partnering with 49 employers to create meaningful, integrated employment opportunities.

Behind each placement is a team committed to long-term success. We ended the year with 56 individuals in supported employment, with job coaches providing 18,933 hours of on-the-job support, meeting each person where they are while fostering growth, stability, and independence.

Through Supported Employment Services, individuals are not just finding jobs, they are building lives rooted in purpose, connection, and contribution.

Our Community

At Dutton Farm, community involvement is more than an activity, it's an accessible pathway to belonging.

In 2025, that pathway expanded in a powerful way thanks to generous support from PNC Bank, which funded a new transit bus. This investment tackled one of the most significant barriers individuals with disabilities face: transportation. With greater capacity, more participants than ever were able to engage with the world around them.

Throughout the year, Dutton Farm provided over 20,000 rides into the community, making daily outings and community engagement a reality. These experiences strengthen independence in tangible ways, from navigating new environments to building social confidence and essential life skills.

And the adventures were anything but ordinary. Participants took part in special monthly experiences designed to open new doors and create lasting memories, including a behind-the-scenes tour of Little Caesars Arena, an interactive visit to the Michigan Science Center, a baseball game at UWM Baseball Field in Utica, and a trip to the Henry Ford Museum. Moments like these don't just fill a calendar, they fill a life.


Equally powerful is the opportunity to give back. In 2025, participants contributed more than 1,500 volunteer hours across the community, including meaningful time supporting the Auburn Hills Community Center through its Meals on Wheels program.

The Dutton Farm's Meals on Wheels volunteers are a wonderful and reliable group. We see them at the start of every week, and they do a great job out in the community. In 2025, they volunteered over 150 hours to the program," said Jackie Monroy Krieg, director of senior services.

That impact was celebrated when Dutton Farm was named Volunteer of the Year by the Auburn Hills Community Center, an honor reflecting the dedication of our participants.

Because true inclusion isn't just about being present. It's about being welcomed, valued, and engaged.
